Re: Same-sex Marriage - Survey Findings in Wisconsin
TargetPoint Consulting conducted a statewide survey in Wisconsin among 600 registered voters from August 2428 to gauge public opinion about same-sex marriage and support for the Respect for Marriage Act (RMA). The survey indicates that a majority of Wisconsin voters agree that same-sex marriage should be legal and key voting blocs are more likely to support a Senator who votes yes on the RMA.

## Wisconsin Voters Support Valid and Legal Same Sex Marriage

Almost 7 in 10 Wisconsin voters believe same-sex marriages should be recognized as valid by the law. And $\mathbf{7 1 \%}$ of voters agree that the current law of the land, legal same-sex marriage, should remain in place.

- Key finding: More than half (54\%) of Wisconsin Republicans believe that same-sex marriages should be legally valid, and $56 \%$ believe these marriages should remain in place.
- Key finding: A strong majority of independent voters ( $66 \%$ ) believe that same-sex marriages should be legally valid, and $71 \%$ believe these marriages should remain in place.

Almost half ( $43 \%$ ) of all Wisconsin voters are more likely to support a Senator who votes for the Respect for Marriage Act. $78 \%$ of Wisconsin voters are more likely to support a Senator who vote for the RMA or report no negative impact on their vote. Further, nearly a third of voters are much more likely to support a Senator in support of RMA while only $13 \%$ of Wisconsin voters would be much less likely to vote for a Senator in support of RMA.

- Key finding: 66\% of Wisconsin Republicans said they were more likely to support a Senator who votes for the RMA or that it would have no negative impact on their vote.


## Key Voting Blocs are Major Supporters of Same-Sex Marriage and the Respect for Marriage Act

Young and middle-aged voters, including young conservatives, are the most supportive of same-sex marriage and the RMA.

- $77 \%$ of young voters think that marriages between same-sex couples should be recognized by the law as valid, including $65 \%$ of Republicans under 45, $92 \%$ of Democrats under 45 , and $72 \%$ of Independents under 45.


## TargetPoint:

- $\mathbf{6 0 \%}$ of Republicans under $\mathbf{4 5}$ believe the legalization of same-sex marriage should remain in place, while only $27 \%$ believe it should be repealed.
- $53 \%$ of young voters are more likely to support a Senator who votes for RMA. - change to young voters
- Intuitively, young Democrats are leading the charge, but $\mathbf{5 4 \%}$ of Independents under the age of $\mathbf{4 5}$ would also support a Senator who votes for RMA as well.
- $43 \%$ of suburban voters, including $53 \%$ of suburban women are more likely to support a Senator who votes for RMA.


## Strong Families and Strong Communities is a Key Message for Wisconsin Voters

$78 \%$ of voters agree and $56 \%$ of voters strongly agree:
Strong families and lasting relationships strengthen communities and marriage is a fundamental freedom deeply rooted in the history and traditions of our country. American citizens should have the freedom to marry the person they love.

7 in 10 Republicans agree that the Respect for Marriage act maintains the status quo and no religious leader would be forced to consecrate a marriage against their beliefs.

A total of 600 interviews were conducted among registered voters statewide in Wisconsin. Interviews were conducted August 24-28, 2022 with a margin of error of $+/-4.0 \%$. The survey was conducted using web-based interviews and was weighted to reflect statewide demographics including gender, age, race, education and 2020 Presidential vote.
*Total "no impact" responses also include "don't know" responses.
