
Americans across every key demographic support **MATERNAL HEALTH PROGRAMS.**

Voters overwhelmingly support government investment to improve maternal health.

Percent surveyed who **support** federal spending on maternal care:





79% of men and 77% of women agree that the government should do more to fund maternal health programs.

Voters in each state agree that the federal government should do more for maternal health. 75% of undecided voters (on the 2024 presidential ballot)

Believe that improving maternal health in the U.S. is a crucial government investment.

8 out of 10 voters want the government to spend more on maternal health programs.



Voters across the aisle agree that government should invest in maternal health.





Even if funding maternal health leads to higher taxes or cuts in services, 71% of registered voters still think maternal health care is a worthwhile investment. This includes a majority of Republicans (56%) and more than two-thirds of Independents (67%).

METHODOLOGY: The key findings and data shared in this onepager come from Centerline Liberties' recent national survey of 800 registered voters conducted September 12-16, 2024, via mixed mode methodology (cell phones, landlines, online and text-to-web). The survey has a margin of error of +/- 3%.
