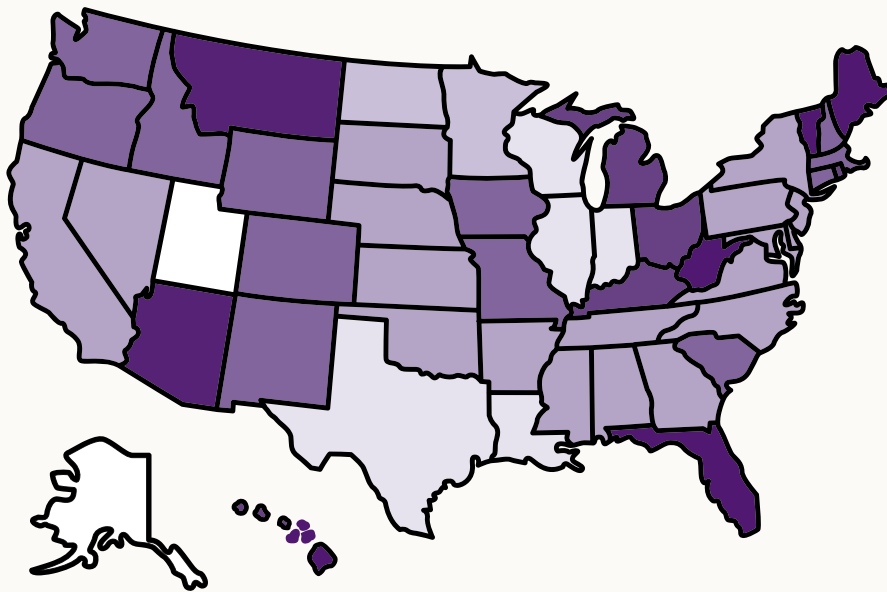


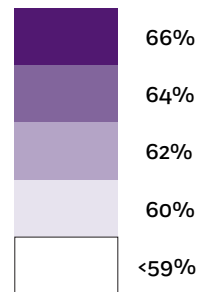
Across all parties and geographies, the American public is ready for **PRIMARY REFORM.**

Americans across the political spectrum **support primary election reform** to produce candidates that are more likely to represent broad swaths of the electorate and maintain a healthy democracy.

STATE-BY-STATE SUPPORT FOR PRIMARY REFORM



Percent surveyed who **agree** primary reform is essential to democracy:



An average of **63% of voters** across the U.S. agree that primary reform is essential to democracy, with especially high support in key swing states, including **Arizona (65%) and Michigan (64%).**¹

Primary reform also scored strongly across every single demographic group studied. The average across **all demographics is +21**, even with **Trump voters (+6), Republicans (+9), and Seniors (+9).**

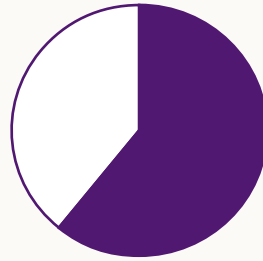

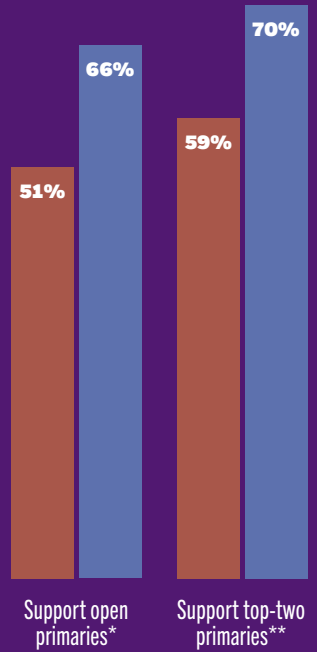
61%

***OPEN PRIMARY SYSTEM:** All voters can participate in taxpayer funded elections regardless of party registration.

****TOP-TWO PRIMARY SYSTEM:** All candidates are listed on the same ballot and the top two with the most votes (regardless of party) advance to the general election, and all eligible voters can participate.

METHODOLOGY: The key findings and data shared in this one-pager come from Centerline Liberties' recent national survey of 800 registered voters conducted September 12-16, 2024, via mixed mode methodology (cell phones, landlines, online and text-to-web). The survey has a margin of error of +/- 3%.
