

Poll Finds Near Universal Agreement On The Importance of Vaccinations And Safety Standards

Data shows broad alignment from registered American voters on the value of vaccinations and government vaccination requirements.

Washington, **D.C.** – A new <u>national poll</u> conducted by Republican pollster Alex Lundry on behalf of <u>Centerline Liberties</u> shows a broad agreement on the importance of vaccinations, the most trusted sources for vaccine information, and support for the government's role in setting recommendations.

Most notably, the survey of 800 registered voters found a nearly universal (85%) agreed with a statement that emphasized the importance of getting vaccinated in order to protect vulnerable family and community members. It also found that 71% are comfortable with some level of government vaccination requirement.

"In recent years, there has been a perception that Americans are divided on the value of vaccinations, however, the data shows otherwise," **said Alex Lundry, Co-founder of Redbud Consulting.** "Policymakers across the country should take these findings into account when shaping vaccine-related regulations."

"Amid the politics and noise, one thing Americans agree on is the importance of public health," added James Dozier, President of Centerline Liberties. "With near-universal support for vaccinations to protect vulnerable family and community members, legislation and political rhetoric should reflect this shared priority."

Topline numbers include:

- Broad agreement on vaccinations' value.
 - 63% say it is extremely or very important that individuals get vaccinated, likely the same 63% who say they keep up to date with vaccines that their doctor or other healthcare professionals recommend.
 - 70% of parents keep their kids up to date on vaccines, while only 63% of Americans say they themselves are up to date.
 - o 73% agree with a pro-vaccine statement.

- Large majorities of Republicans remain pro-vaccine.
 - Even when given an option to choose a statement that is more cautious about vaccines, a 58% majority of the GOP agreed with the pro-vaccine statement.
 - Approximately 75% of Republicans agreed that "Getting vaccinated is important not just for my own health, but also to protect vulnerable family members, friends and community members..."
- The medical community is the most trusted source of vaccination information, while the media is the least trusted.
 - 60% trust a great deal in information on vaccines from their personal doctor or healthcare provider.
 - 40% trust a great deal in information on vaccines from the American Academy of Pediatrics.
 - Across Democrats, Independents and Republicans, the least trusted sources were social media (40% not at all), HHS Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr (37%) and podcasts (35%).
- Broad support for cross-state consortium.
 - 62% of voters support state-led consortiums that establish their own vaccine safety standards and recommendations.
 - When asked which level of government they think should have primary responsibility for vaccine decisions, a 37% plurality chose federal government agencies like the CDC.
 - 70% are comfortable with some level of government vaccine requirements and recommendations, while only 30% believe it should be up to parents and individuals without any government involvement.
